V&A Innovate Challenge 2023

Mr Hill recently spoke at the annual teachers' conference at the V&A, providing insight into the process of offering V&A Innovate Challenge opportunity to the entire pupil population of Houlton School. Houlton School is the only school in the UK to offer every pupil the chance to take part over the course of an entire school day.

V&A Innovate is an annual National Schools Challenge, asking students in Years 7, 8 and 9 to work in teams of between 4 - 6 to design a solution to a real-world problem.

The V&A are asking students to work in teams to follow a human-centred

design process and respond to one of the three challenge themes inspired by V&A collections:

Adapt: How might we adapt the world around us? How might we adapt everyday items, buildings and spaces to make them more inclusive of people's needs?

Care: How might we create objects that care? How might we create environments that show or provide care for others?

Disrupt: How might we use design to introduce new perspectives on issues we care about? How might we challenge stereotypes through design? Students submit their ideas on two A3 design sheets and finalist teams are invited to pitch their ideas to our expert judges at our annual Pitching and Awards Day at the museum.

Robots come to Houlton

Coding and robotics are changing our world. Design & Technology at Houlton School aims to be at the forefront of exploring how coding, programming and robotics can fit into the modern world.

Over the next term, all Year 8 pupils will begin their coding journey by programming electronics as part of the current Big Question; Should We Sleep in The Dark? Alongside this, pupils attending D&T Club as part of the extra-curricular offering will gain first-hand experience of what robots are capable of.

STEM education is an important part of our curriculum as it teaches young people the building blocks of how to think and problem solve. STEMbased products surround us all and as people interact more with machines it becomes more important for us to understand how they work.

We aim for all pupils to gain hands on experience with this technology to inspire their own curiosity and build confidence navigating new and emerging technologies.

English and Acting

This half-term, through studying Ele Fountain's novel, Boy 87, our Year 7 pupils have been learning about the global refugee crisis. Through this work, the Year 7s have explored ideas about power, otherness and the adversity faced by millions of refugees around the world.

Throughout this topic, pupils have been improving their oracy skills through debate and discussion around big issues like race, gender, and dehumanisation. They have also been expanding their knowledge of the modern world by reading articles for homework surrounding the refugee crisis.

Year 8 have been diving into the world of Greek Mythology and reading Geraldine McCaughrean's modern adaptation of Homer's The Odyssey. Pupils have been improving their literacy skills through exploring vocabulary, that they will need for KS4, when studying Macbeth and other GCSE texts, such as 'hubris'. To aid their understanding, Year 8 also brought The Odyssey to life, through the creation of freeze-frames showing their knowledge of each Chapter. To provide continuity within their learning, the Acting curriculum mirrors the pupils' English studies. In Year 7, pupils have had the opportunity to develop their understanding of characterisation and explore what it is like to empathise with those directly affected by the refugee crisis. Year 8, meanwhile, have begun studying Ancient Greek theatre through the play Antigone. More specifically, they have engaged in chorus work, looking at the concept of unison and how masks can be used within a performance.

What is Geography?



Year 7 pupils are exploring the Big Question: What is Geography?

Pupils have been investigating a vast range of geographical topics including, continental drift theory, income inequality in England, contrasting countries and regions in England. The purpose of this is for pupils to experience what Geography covers and to explore Geography's importance in their world. Pupils have completed world class work, developing their Geography knowledge and skills.

Our Year 8 Geography pupils have been exploring the Big Question: What are the threats to the biosphere?

Pupils have investigated the distribution of biomes and factors which influence this. Pupils have researched biodiversity hotspots in the Horn of Africa and South China, helping them to understand the importance of biodiversity and endemic species. Pupils have discussed the threats to the biosphere including logging, urbanisation, cattle ranching, and mining.

Ultimately, pupils are working together in teams to practice oracy, the ability to speak like a geographer. At the end of the half-term students will present their presentations to the class, developing their linguistic and body language skills, to develop their oracy skills and develop into a world class orator.

Exploring Roman artefacts

Year 7 historians got the chance to get hands on with History this half term, when they explored Roman artefacts in their lessons. As part of their big question, focusing on what Rugby was like during Roman occupation, they handled artefacts from the local Roman settlement of Tripontium.

The students explored how life changed from a military relay station, into a Roman settlement, and even got to handle a 2,000-year-old Roman tile. We also explored parts of the Dunsmore Plain, investigating whether the school field could have been the final battle ground of Boudicca. Having the opportunity to bring the past to life in the classroom is one of the key principles of the History department and we look forward to offering more opportunities in the coming months.

October is also Black History Month. As a department, we aim to embed opportunities to study the History of the world through different perspectives throughout the year, not just the month of October.



Science: Houlton's first dissection

All aspects of science are interrelated and the first half term in Year 8 has been spent looking at how physics and biology are linked.

The topic for this unit is energy and pupils have looked at how organs like eyes and ears have evolved to transfer energy efficiently so that the brain can detect it. The most exciting part of this unit allowed pupils to learn about the anatomy of a mammalian eye and then dissect one. Through careful incision using dissection scissors, pupils cut around the tough sclera to reveal the dark retina inside. Fluid inside the eye called vitreous humor makes the location of the soft lens challenging, but careful removal allows for the lens to be isolated.

Pupils could then place the lens on a newspaper and then notice that the text became magnified. Concepts like refraction and energy transfer are essential for the understanding of how the anatomy of an eye relates to its function, and pupils gained practical experience through their first ever dissection! Particularly fitting with Halloween around the corner.
