## V&A Houlton School pupils win V&A Innovate National Schools Award

We are incredibly proud to announce that a group of pupils from Houlton School have won a prestigious V&A Innovate National Schools Award.

The pupils, who are all members of Houlton's Obama College, took part in the national challenge to design a solution to a real-world problem.

With close to 2,000 pupils taking part, 119 teams entering ideas and just 50 pupils from across the country selected for the Annual Pitching and Awards Day at the V&A Museum in London, the competition was tough.

Taking inspiration from the V&A's 'Design: 1900 – Now' galleries, pupils were tasked with proposing design ideas for the themes of Renew, Connect, and Move. This included a focus on more sustainable uses of materials and ways of living, ways to support people to (re)connect following COVID-19, and more inclusive ways to keep active and enjoy the outdoors.

During the Pitching and Awards Day, our Houlton School pupils spent the day taking part in creative workshops with designers, where they also saw their work on display and stood up in front of a full auditorium to showcase their brilliant design projects to a panel of industry judges.

After wowing the judges with their entry, the Houlton School team walked away with the award for the winning entry for the Move category. Their design, entitled 'The Rewalkable' was an adjustable, moisture sensing walking stick for the partially sighted, made from recycled products.

Mr Russell Hill, Subject Leader: Creative at Houlton School, said: "Our young designers were so excited to win this award. They have worked incredibly hard and it was fantastic that the judges recognised their incredible creativity, innovation and teamwork.

'The Rewalkable' was commended by professionals on the day as being something truly innovative and that has no similar counterpart to the market.

Miss Chloe Buckenham, Houlton's Vice Principal, accompanied the pupils alongside the pioneers of the project, Mr Hill and Miss Hill and said. "It was an absolute privilege to see our pupils present on the day. We are so proud of their achievement. They are truly World Class." This year's V&A Award judges were:



### **World Class Schools**

This March, Houlton School hosted the World Class Schools Quality Mark (WCSQM) Assessment Centre, welcoming 175 pupils from 30 primary and secondary schools applying for WCSQM re-accreditation. The assessment centre event marked a return to in-person assessment events for the education charity that works to accredit non-selective schools from around the UK as World Class. In order to achieve World Class Quality Mark accreditation, pupils must demonstrate World Class characteristics, using the WCSQM framework of characteristics as a benchmark of the skills and competencies young people need to thrive in an ever-changing global economy.

Visiting pupils were given two weeks to prepare and a day to complete eleven innovative, attractive and environmentally friendly outdoor and indoor spaces, all incorporating the Houlton School values. Pupils worked together to design a sensory garden, eco-friendly seating, murals, sculptures and tree hangings, supported by Houlton's staff and partners as industry experts, with advice from a focus group of Houlton's Year 7 pupils who acted as Project Managers for the day. This challenging reallife project gave pupils a unique opportunity to not only develop and demonstrate their World Class characteristics and LORIC skills, but to enjoy a much-needed return to the

social development, work experience and collaboration opportunities pupils have missed out on over the past two years.

Accredited World Class schools are invited to apply for re-accreditation biennially to prove their school is consistently World Class. The assessment centre is one of a two-part reaccreditation process for the 30 participating schools, the second part of which involves pupils using the WCSQM online app to demonstrate their World Class characteristics across a number of framework areas including learning, leadership, the workplace and community. Once completed, pupils have access to a downloadable portfolio of their World Class skills and competencies they can use to inform, for example, further education and employment applications. Our pupils have been busy working on the app this year and we hope to put Houlton School forward for accreditation next year.

Houlton School would like to thank all the pupils and staff involved in the day and to give special thanks to David Palmer (Palmer Pallets Ltd), Lovell, Morgan Sindall, Finham Park School, and Friends of Houlton School for their generosity and support in providing a large number of resources (including themselves on the day!)

### The wonders of Pi


On 14th March (3.14 using the US date system) we celebrated Pi Day.

Pupils learnt how Pi was first calculated by the ancient Babylonians and Archimedes before being popularised with William Jones using the symbol  $\pi$ . We then looked at the fantastic uses of this irrational number and how it connects to so much of the world around us including:

- · How rivers meander?
- How we measure stars?
- Why Zebras are stripy?
- What it has to do with the pyramids in Egypt?

In our lessons we did a range of activities revolving around Pi, such as calculating Pi by measuring circular objects' circumference and diameter and replicating Comte de Buffon's probability experiment by throwing toothpicks in the classroom to estimate pi.

It wasn't all maths related though as pupils wrote Pi-Kus and learnt about the history of Pi and its connections to the world around us.

## **Celebrating British Science Week**



Every year, schools across the country take part in British Science Week. This annual event aims to inspire the next generation of scientists and is an excellent opportunity for pupils to step away from the curriculum and take part in some extra fun activities (I say extra fun, as science is always fun). The theme of this year's event is "Growth" and with this in mind, pupils looked at how growth can be seen across biology, chemistry and physics.

Chemistry is perhaps the most challenging area of science to think about growth, as our minds naturally jump to the growth of seeds or baby animals. But growth means to get larger, and there are many things in chemistry that "get larger", one of which being the volume of gas during an explosion. By my own admission, this is a tenuous link, but as far as I am concerned any opportunity for a scientific explosion is a good one. With this in mind, pupils witnessed an

exploding hydrogen balloon in their science lessons, followed by three methane rockets in our auditorium during their assembly. The rockets in particular have an especially violent reaction and pupils were amazed to see the force and hear the boom from this controlled demonstration.

Space is always an area of interest in physics, and again this year's theme could link to it, thinking about the life cycle of stars and the expansion of our universe. But instead, we focused on the "growth" of buildings and how engineering is helping to build buildings which are taller than ever. Pupils completed a competition to see who could build the tallest tower using nothing but spaghetti and marshmallows, with some very impressive architectural forms on show!

The final task of the week was looking at biology, and the more obvious forms of growth that we can see in our world.

Population growth was one such area of interest this week, but perhaps the more exciting aspect was the opportunity to plant sunflower seeds. Each pupil in each college has planted a different sunflower which will eventually be planted out and tended to in our campus grounds. This show of growth which we should all be able to see going into our summer months will provide food and shelter for many other organisms and provide that all important ecological "growth" in our own school grounds.

British Science Week also has an annual poster competition in which Houlton School is participating. By the end of term, pupils will submit their optional posters for judging, with the best 5 entries being entered for the national competition. Watch this space to see who makes it through!


For 60 lucky pupils, the day got even better, as they joined in with creative writing workshops run by Ele. Here, they worked on creating original narratives and got professional advice on their writing. These pupils were selected as a reward for their continued efforts on the Bedrock vocabulary programme and we look forward to next term, where we will be having even more awards for their hard work.

In addition, we hosted the Great Bookish Bake-Off, where keen bakers brought in book-themed cakes and biscuits to sell to staff and pupils, with all proceeds going to buy more books for the school's Centre for Communications. The creativity and deliciousness on display was incredible, with the 3 intended winners stretching to 10 because of the high quality of the bakes. These pupils received a copy of Melt by Ele Fountain and first place will also be receiving an Amazon gift voucher for their efforts.

Finally, throughout the day, pupils were able to take part in the Big Book Swap, where they brought in books that they had already read and swapped them for another pupil's book.

Though hundreds of books lined the refectory at the start of the day, by the end, none were left as the Book Swap was such a success! It was lovely to see so many of our pupils making the most of a day that celebrates the joy and impact of literature, but was particularly wonderful to witness how much the love of reading is spreading throughout our Houlton family.





### **Creating children's books**

Pupils have also been working in teams to create their own children's books.

They had to plan, write, illustrate, edit and publish their creations as six-page storybooks designed to help young children to learn. The topics of their books varied, including the numbers 1-10, key animal facts, how to identify emotions, making friends, being confident, facing fears and many more. The finished products have now been completed and will be delivered to Reception pupils at Henry Hinde Infant School.

### **Houlton School's Poetry Gallery**

Since January, Houlton pupils have been studying poetry in their English lessons. The pupils began by conducting research into the different forms of poetry, from Sonnets to Calligrams, which they then created presentations about. After sharing their presentations, they worked in pairs to create some fantastic poems, which are now proudly displayed in the Houlton School Poetry Gallery, outside their English classroom, for all of our staff and pupils to enjoy.

We are now moving on to the study of slam poetry and look forward to helping our pupils to explore social issues in the modern world through this emotive and passionate medium.

## **Exploring Art and Design**

# The Big Question: Is it all about you?

"My work forces me to deal with the things I probably lack, like not being an extrovert or being reserved" – Gillian Wearing, Turner Prize Winner 1997

As young creatives, our artists are on the path of discovery, continuously navigating who they are, what they believe in and ultimately, who they will become.

Our current Big Question deals with these questions through an array of art forms, such as performance, video and mixed media. Introducing pupils to artists who create work in response to their culture, heritage, personal history and experiences, helps our pupils to reflect on their own social and moral status and asks them to build on their expanding identity whilst advancing their ability to explore, experiment and refine their ideas.

When writing this Big Question and scheme of learning, I was reminded of my own experience of art in secondary school. For me, the art studio was a space that offered safety, protection and challenge and while that challenge was daunting, it ignited a spark that continues to burn brightly today as I teach our pupils.

At Houlton School, art lessons are not about formulaic routes to achievement, nor are they a rigid, prescribed process of learning. We actively promote a sense of enquiry, and by its very nature, this enquiry may be linear for some, but for most, the route to achievement may be meandering and complex. It is critical that both are valued equally.

Due to the reflective nature of artmaking, many of our pupils will take time to 'find their lane' and as with my own educational experience, this discovery can occur at different stages during a pupil's school career. I feel responsible in affording each pupil the time and space to allow this discovery to take place and a great deal of thought is placed upon this when writing a project or creating episodes of learning.

Regular challenges are a key part of Art & Design education at Houlton School and can frequently provoke pupils' interest; however, academic achievement can only be understood in the context of art by looking at the entire pupil, their context, their experience and personal circumstance, both pastorally and academically. It is with great excitement that I can share with you the names of some pupils who have found their lane towards the end of their first year at Houlton School and I am increasingly excited to help them on their personal discovery.


