Ofsted praises Houlton School in newly released pre-registration inspection report

In a newly released report, Ofsted inspectors have praised Houlton School, which is run by the Transforming Lives Educational Trust (TLET), for the provision that was put in place by leaders ahead of opening for the first time in September 2021.

The report, which relates to a statutory preregistration inspection that took place in May 2021, details findings based on compliance with expected standards across a range of areas including: quality of leadership and management; spiritual moral, social and cultural development of students; and premises and accommodation.

During their visit to the brand-new school, inspectors reported that leaders and trustees "are highly effective and have considerable experience in running successful schools." They added, "leaders are suitably ambitious for this new school community. They are determined and committed to providing a world-class education and transforming the lives of all stakeholders."

After scrutinising a range of documentation and speaking with school leaders, the Trust CEO and the Chair of the Trust Board, inspectors also concluded that: "Leaders place spiritual, moral, social and cultural education at the heart of the curriculum so that pupils flourish and are well prepared for life beyond school...Policies and plans for personal, health and social education reflect the trust's values of kindness, loyalty and courage, and the school's commitment to developing confident individuals and responsible citizens."

On the suitability of the premises and accommodation – which features a $\pm 39m$,

20 acre campus that occupies the Grade II historic listed buildings that previously housed Rugby International Radio Station, as well as brand new state-of-the-art buildings - the report also concluded that: "The school campus provides a range of classrooms, laboratories and specialist teaching spaces resourced to enhance pupils' learning... The school has a large sports hall, a dance studio and extensive outdoor space."

Michael McCulley, Principal at Houlton School, said: "At Houlton School innovation, aspiration and excellence are at the heart of all we do, and I am incredibly pleased that this has been recognised by Ofsted.

"Of course, since the time of the inspection we have welcomed our founding Year 7 pupils and it has been a great privilege to see them flourishing in their new secondary school, making the most of the world-class learning opportunities we have to offer in this unique and truly inspirational setting." James Higham, CEO of the Transforming Lives Educational Trust, added: "From the very outset, we have been absolutely clear on our vision for this wonderful school. The many positive comments we received as part of the pre-registration inspection are a testament to the efforts of everyone involved in making this vision a reality. Our thanks go to all of our partners who have worked tirelessly with us to provide such an exceptional school for our pupils."

Houlton School's pre-opening inspection was carried out by Ofsted at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, under section 99(1) of the Education and Skills Act 2008. Murder Mystery Our Houlton scientists carry out forensic tests to find the culprit

It was a cold and wet December morning when pupils at Houlton School learnt of the tragic murder of Mrs Forrest, our teaching assistant. When making a cup of morning coffee, she was ruthlessly poisoned and left for dead on the staff room floor, only to be discovered by her devastated colleagues. But not all of the Houlton colleagues were equally devastated, and many of them had their own motivation for committing this heinous crime!

Houlton science pupils were given the task of acting as forensic scientists, and over the course of multiple practical lessons they investigated different pieces of evidence to narrow down the suspect list.

The first task involved filtering the "poison" to remove the sand and dirt, which had been added to help hide the poison. This didn't stop our scientists, however, who then used evaporation to extract the mystery poison. Now that the poison had been extracted, Houlton investigators used flame tests to compare the colour of the flame with a series of known chemicals which allowed them to identify the metal in the poison. A pen had also been found at the scene along with a murder note. Using chromatography, the forensic scientists compared the pen to other pens until a match was found, providing further evidence and further narrowing down the suspects. Muddy footprints also left the crime scene, and new knowledge on acids and alkalis and how they affect garden plant life allowed investigators to identify the murderer as someone with acidic soil in their garden... we were getting closer.

Finally, an investigation into rates of reaction using calcium carbonate and hydrochloric acid identified that the poison must have been ground into a fine powder if it was to dissolve in time for the murderer to flee the scene before Mrs Forrest became suspicious. When added to all the other pieces of evidence, this led to only one conclusion...

As we move ever closer to the rigors of GCSE examinations, it is critical that pupils develop an understanding of the theoretical principles that govern the design and making process, and I hope that these well-defined spaces will support pupils on that journey. As a strong believer in the power of collaboration, these spaces will soon be teeming with activity as pupils investigate and decipher complex problems in collaboration with department staff. Encouraging an open dialogue between each pupil is central to the development of our young designers, inside and outside the classroom and our staff learn just as much from their innate creativity.

Generating ideas is by far the biggest challenge for our pupils as they rely on lived experience, social conscience and their ethical and moral positioning. The most common question heard within the Ideas Lab is 'Sir, I don't have any ideas', and, therefore, this is the question that we aim to solve without compromise or judgement. Our young designers are encouraged to look at the wider context and the larger problem at stake, provoking their ambition and igniting their ability to create our future.

Pupils this term have so far experienced the following:

Technical Drawing (CAD), Laser Cutting (CAM), Plastic Forming, Cardboard Construction, Rapid Prototyping, 3D Printing, Product Analysis, Design Strategies, Iterative Design and Evaluation principles.

Design is synonymous with the past, present and future and our pupils have been firmly seated in the present whilst exploring the Big Question: Can We Turn Junk into Funk?



Plastic lids turned into sheet material




Joel M exploring his prototype

Can Art Change Minds?

It is without question that art has the ability to change society and our pupils are becoming incredibly adept at cultivating their artistic voice. Houlton artists have been responding to political, social and economic happenings and discovering if art has a place among such issues.

Delving through over 300 pages of current newspapers, pupils have responded to current affairs by selecting words and reappropriating them to create phrases and slogans that can offer new meanings. Exploring the work of artist Barbara Kruger, pupils were tasked with creating a large protest poster which became part of a collective performance around the school site, exploring art as a form of activism and a socially engaged practice. In addition to text works, pupils have been immersed in a breadth of historical material from artworks which explore the AIDS epidemic in the 1980s to performance art that raises questions about women's rights in 1960s America. Each lesson pupils analyse a piece of artwork and are encouraged to develop their subject specific vocabulary in response to themes, images, context and the embedded meaning within each artwork.

It is crucial that all pupils are exposed and encouraged to develop their critical faculties in the context of art so they are equipped with the historical knowledge and technical theory attributed to a range of artworks and art making methods. This knowledge forms the core of Art and Design practice at Houlton School.


