


Festive Extravaganza

We hosted our first ever Festive Extravaganza on Friday 10 December to mark the start of the festive season. We were delighted that we raised over £260 in support of Bone Cancer Research Trust, especially given our school has just 180 pupils and the suggested donation was just £1. Pupils enjoyed a carousel of activities on a collapsed timetable, meaning we could explore different ways of learning including discovering how the festive period looks in different parts of the world. After lunch, our entire Houlton Family was joined by AIM Board Partners (governors) and our CEO, and we enjoyed a hugely impressive Extravaganza Showcase! This included performances from our Choir, Dance, Acting, and Public Speaking co-curricular groups. The afternoon culminated in our pupils having a great time singing along to some wellknown festive tunes together. As we were unable to invite our wider Houlton Family to see our Extravaganza Show this year due to COVID-19, we will be sending out an extra special highlights video of the day that all our Houlton School families can enjoy together at home. Committing this special day in Year 7's founding year to film means families and future generations of Houlton pupils will be able to enjoy it (and look back on it) for years to come.



Houlton Hegarty Heroes

Pupils in Year 7 were introduced to HegartyMaths at the start of this term to help support them with their maths work and to give them an opportunity to expand their mathematical knowledge independently.

Houlton pupils readily accepted the challenge and have (at the time of writing) answered 46,493 questions so far! This has equated to 862 hours of additional learning across the year, or almost 36 days!

It has been a tough competition between the colleges but after a strong battle, Obama has come out on top having answered 10,568 questions alone! Individually we have had some exceptional scores with the winners from each college as follows:

59 pupils have joined the 100% club this term and have shown that they want to aim for green and go back to areas they have found challenging and repeat them in order to succeed. I have been blown away by their resilience and perseverance, demonstrating our key Houlton values.

Looking towards the next term I want to challenge our pupils to hit 100,000 questions as a year group. Some of our pupils are already expanding their knowledge by researching and looking at areas of maths we won't cover until much later such as Trigonometry, Pythagoras and even A-Level Integration; I can't wait to see how far they can go!

To end on a quote from Ruby in Armstrong College, whose attitude has been amazing so far this year and summarises the message we try to promote in maths:

"I did try my best and I know that's all that matters :)"

STEM club inspires

The past term has seen students attempt the very first STEM Club challenge - Egg Parachutes!

Houlton pupils have had to look at variables and design techniques to plan an investigation looking at the best type of parachute to protect an egg from an 8m high drop. After careful planning and extensive research, they then created five parachutes, each with all bar one variables controlled. Pupils then took their creations to the historic stairs in Transmission Hall to test their creations.

Although there were a few egg fatalities, many of the parachutes worked beautifully and we certainly have some future engineers in the making!

English and Literacy News

Houlton pupils have been working hard this term on their analysis and creative writing skills. We have seen some lovely pieces of work created from every College. Have a look at some samples of student work inspired by the image below from *The Arrival*:

"The engine growls obnoxiously as we trudge into the storm" – by Alice (Winton).

"The mirror that covered his eyes had broken long ago; writhing agony leaked through the shards" – by Isobel (Obama).

"Furious waves bellowed like an angry mob." – by Maisie (Morse).

"It felt like the world had no colour or joy left in it." – by Isabella (Dorsey).

"Her lips were sore and cracked, just like her grief-stricken heart." – by Gabi (Armstrong). "I can feel the misery in the air. Night is falling." – by Estelle (Shakespeare).

In addition, pupils have begun a new programme for their homework called, 'Bedrock Vocabulary', which uses an algorithm to help pupils to learn personalised tier 2 vocabulary. After an initial vocabulary test, pupils were assigned a block of vocabulary to learn, which includes fiction and non-fiction reading around a variety of interesting topics.

Each week, they will complete a minimum of 2 Bedrock lessons or 30 minutes of time on Bedrock, in which they play a series of games to learn new vocabulary. Each lesson gains them points and each half term a competition is held where pupils have a target number of points to achieve. If they succeed in accruing the required amount of points by the deadline, they will be automatically entered into a prize draw and could end up winning a £10 voucher or Chromebook laptop for their efforts! Pupils were very excited to get started on this programme and really seem to understand that 'the limits of our vocabulary are the limits of our world'; we cannot wait to see them using this vocabulary to broaden and deepen their thinking about the world that we live in.

Pupils have also really been enjoying the

Centre for Communications, where they can explore the wonderful variety of literature that we have available to them. They have been conducting treasure hunts in their library sessions to try and find different kinds of fiction and non-fiction books that might interest them; they have been reading everything, from the action-packed Alex Rider series to historical fiction like, *Things a Bright Girl Can Do*. Pupils love the resource and their time to read for pleasure and staff have been enjoying displaying their reading recommendations for pupils to see.

Research shows that 20 minutes or more a day of reading (or listening to an audio book) will improve academic achievement across all subject areas, not to mention the wonderful benefits of reading on mental health. This is why we are so excited that Houlton pupils have such a well-resourced space, with a variety of dynamic and engaging texts to choose from. We hope to be able to continue this love of literature throughout their education and make life-long readers out of all members of the Houlton family.

Their team-work and evaluation skills have also developed immeasurably since the beginning of term; we cannot wait to mix up the pupil groupings following the winter break to allow them to develop their ability to work with an even wider range of people. Award winning design

We are delighted to announce that our Creative Technician, Miss Darcy Hill has received a prestigious design award at the Global Design Graduate Show 2021, the biggest ever online showcase of graduating creatives worldwide.

Miss Hill has received the Furniture Design Award for her stunning piece 'The Potter's Chair'.

In a description of the piece, Miss Hill said: "The Potter's Chair is a chair for makers designed by a maker.

"The principal purpose of this chair is to work alongside a potter's wheel; the seat and frame are not connected which enables the seat to be positioned on different tilts. This allows the potter to sit in a better position when throwing. Designed for utilitarian use, every element is considered and serves the motive.

"The entire seat is handcrafted from Oak. Each strut of the frame is turned, the back rest is laminated, with small brass features and a ceramic coin which allows the potter to stamp their own makers mark on the chair. The organic-shaped seat has been carefully moulded and cut on the CNC. It is all finished with white oil which brings out the grain in a beautifully subtle way.

"If you are creating a piece of art, you shouldn't be sat on a chair that belongs in an office" was a quote that followed the project from the start. As many potters told me during the research phase, they sit on whatever they can find - from old dining chairs to upside down buckets. This is a chair tailored for them.

"The design was to be simple yet beautifully crafted and for each element, not to overpower but to work harmoniously together to create a functional, yet elegant item of furniture which fits within a potter's creative studio. The design was influenced by Japanese craftsmanship, allowing the humble elements to speak for themselves."




