Introduction





Dear parents and carers,

As we approach the next stage of transition, it is an exciting time both in our Year 9 inaugural pupils' academic journeys but also in the evolution of our Houlton family. We are delighted to introduce in this booklet our Key Stage 4 curriculum options which are designed to ensure that our pupils are ready and fully equipped for their future education and career choices.

At Houlton School we have designed a curriculum that is ambitious and that will give all pupils the knowledge and cultural capital they need to be confident global citizens and succeed in whichever pursuits they choose in adult life. Coupled with a comprehensive personal development programme, our Key Stage 4 curriculum is designed to ensure that all pupils have both the academic currency, and skills needed for their next steps. We underpin all that we do in our LORIC (leadership, organisation, resilience independence and communication) curriculum to ensure that pupils have a foundation to succeed in whatever choices they make and aim to offer a rich and diverse set of options for pupils to choose from.

We encourage you to talk together as a family as we will be doing with pupils in school to support and guide each individual in making the right choices for themselves that they will enjoy and in which they have the maximum chance of greatest success.

You will be aware that there have been many recent changes in the educational landscape which are impacting schools nationally and that schools are no longer measured by the government in terms of the percentage of pupils attaining certain grades but rather by the amount of progress made by all. Your child's grades for GCSEs will be measured on a 9 to 1 scale and progress for every child looks different.

This is why it is important to us that we continue to be innovative in our teaching and support our pupils through mixed attainment classes to ensure that all individuals can be nurtured and can make progress that is excellent for them. Our curriculum is pupil centred and designed to offer a range of subjects that appeal to all pupils.

You will see in the booklet below information about all the core, English Baccalaureate and option subjects so that you can discuss at home the best options for your child.

Since 2022 the government's ambition is that pupils study the English Baccalaureate which at Houlton School will require all pupils to choose at least one humanities subject (either History or Geography) and at least one language (either French or Spanish). Pupils who wish to choose both languages or both humanities subjects can then do so in their free choices if they wish. Pupils will also all study English, Mathematics and Science as well as PHRSE, short course Religious Studies (full course Religious Studies is available as an option choice) and core PE. Pupils will then have a choice of their remaining four options of which we have a complement of both GCSE and Level 2 gualifications. Staff at Houlton will be supporting pupils in making the right choices for them based on their future aspirations, interests and skills.

Summarised on the next page you will be able to see the choices which are,

subject to levels of interest, available. All pupils will be asked to select initial preferences for options as a canvassing exercise which will give us the opportunity to block subjects and make informed decisions regarding courses.

We would then like to invite you to our **Year 9 Options Evening** which is taking place on **Thursday 26th of October** in the Power Hall Auditorium. This event will give you the opportunity to discuss the subjects available and our curriculum for Key Stage 4 with our staff. To ensure that all families can attend, we would like to invite families with surnames A-K to the 5:00pm presentation and families with surnames H- Z to the 6:00pm presentation.

Following the information evening, pupils will have the half term break where upon our return will be asked to make their final choices. We will endeavour to ensure pupils have their first choices where possible but will require reserve choices where first preferences are not available.

We look forward to working with you in the next stage of our journey together and to welcoming our first key stage for cohort next year.

Business Studies



GCSE Business can help you prepare for further and higher education. You will become skilled in making decisions, being creative, solving problems, understanding finance, dealing with data, communicating and working as part of team. The Business course could lead to work in a business-related profession such as accountancy, law, marketing or the leisure and tourism industry. All the Business rooms are equipped with Internetlinked PCs. You will be encouraged to use them to help carry out your research, to present your assessed work and to produce presentations.

What will I study?

You will be introduced to the world of small businesses and find out how to develop an idea and spot an opportunity and turn that into a successful business. You will understand how to make a business effective and manage money. You will also see how the world around us affects small businesses and all the people

involved. After understanding how small businesses are run vour focus will be on larger businesses and the strategies businesses use to grow their business and make it profitable. There will be elements of Marketing, Production, Finance and Human Resources included in the course. You will understand how these different functions work in a business and their objectives. There will be a lot more focus on the Finance aspect of a business where you will learn how to create cash flows and analyse break even graphs. The course will be challenging with some aspects of A level finance included such as average rate of return. The exams will expect you to write essay style answers using analytical skills and be able to conclude your answers with your opinion and be able to justify it. Unlike previous years there will be no controlled assessment in GCSE and there will be exams at the end of Year 11.

Who would this course suit?

If you enjoy: • communicating and explaining your ideas • thinking

creatively and making decisions • working with numbers to solve business problems • learning about the world of business through research and investigation You will need to learn and apply your knowledge of key terms for the exam units. You will need to be confident in maths as you will be expected to perform calculations and construct graphs.

How can I use this course after Year 11 / in the future?

You may decide to study a Business Studies course at A Level or college or choose an apprenticeship. The skills developed on the courses (giving presentations, gathering research, producing balanced written arguments and financial calculations) will help you in any future job or even to set up your own business. Past students have gone on to study many Business-related degrees such as Management, Marketing, Human Resources and Accounting.

Computer Science



What will I study?

Offering an exciting, practical focus on real-life programming as well as the key theories behind Computer Science, this course develops pupils with relevant skills for the future.

Combining written and practical elements pupils will explore the theory of Computer Science within five of the six comprehensive topic areas, including computational thinking, networks, data representation and issues and impacts. The sixth unit allows pupils to analyse and solve problems by designing, writing, testing and refining programs.

Who would this course suit? Pupils with:

Mathematical skills, willingness to develop new language skills, computer knowledge and technology skills, understanding of problem solving, enjoy creating solutions to problems, have an enquiring mind.

How can I use this course after Year 11 / in the future?

Computer Programming, Teaching, App Development, Cybersecurity, Game Development, Website Design, Software Engineer, Network Deployment Engineer/ Manager, Data Analyst.

English Language

What will I study?

GCSE English Language focuses on the exploration of unseen fiction and non-fiction texts. Pupils will conduct structure and language and analysis, as well as evaluation, comparison and summary. In addition, they will enjoy creative writing from various stimuli, as well as writing non-fiction texts to communicate their perspective. Pupils will also improve their oracy skills through presenting to an audience on a topic that is important to them.

Who would this course suit?

Literacy skills – reading (comprehension, inference and analysis), writing (including SPaG), vocabulary, oracy. Research skills (context) and revision skills.

How can I use this course after Year 11 / in the future?

All careers and further education courses use well-developed literacy skills and all employers require at least a grade 4 in English Language GCSE. QUALIFICATION: GCSE English Language EXAM BOARD: AQA

English Literature



What will I study?

GCSE English Literature allows pupils to explore deep themes and messages within a variety of text forms. These include plays such as An Inspector Calls and Macbeth, as well as the AQA 'Power and Conflict' Poetry Anthology and the novella A Christmas Carol. In addition, they develop skills which allow them to interpret any text, such as unseen poetry.

Who would this course suit?

Literacy skills – reading (comprehension, inference and analysis), writing (including SPaG), vocabulary, oracy. Research skills (context) and revision skills.

How can I use this course after Year 11 / in the future?

All careers and further education courses use well-developed literacy skills.

Film Studies



What will I study?

Drawing upon pupils' enthusiasm for film, this course aims to introduce them to a variety of cinematic experiences through films which have been important in the development of film and film technology.

Starting with the US mainstream in the 50's before moving towards the 70's and 80's pupils will learn about Hollywood's development and also receive an insight into US independent film. Pupils will also look at films from Europe including the UK, South Africa and Australia.

Pupils are also given the opportunity, as part of the specification, to delve into production aspects of film, using their own exposure to a diverse range of films to craft their own screenwriting and production skills.

Who would this course suit?

Communication skills, Effective writing skills, Analytical skills. An enjoyment of film and curiosity and drive to develop own creative ideas.

How can I use this course after Year 11 / in the future?

Runner, broadcasting/film/video, Runner, broadcasting/film/video, Film/Video editor, TV Camera operator, Production designer theatre/film/television.

Fine art practice is defined here as the need to explore an idea, convey an experience or respond to a theme or issue of personal significance.

- land art.

Who would this course suit?

Pupils with the ability to:

• develop their ideas through investigations informed by selecting and critically analysing sources.

Within the context of fine art, students must demonstrate the ability to: Use fine art techniques and processes, appropriate to students' personal intentions, for example:

- mark-making
- monoprint, collagraph and block printing
- assemblage
- construction
- carving
- film and video
- digital working methods

Use media and materials, as appropriate to students' personal intentions, for example:

- charcoal, pastels, pen and ink, crayons and pencil
- watercolour, gouache, acrylic and oil paint
- found materials
- clay, wood and metal
- digital imagery

Food & Nutrition



What will I study?

The Eduqas GCSE in Food Preparation and Nutrition equips learners with the knowledge, understanding and skills required to cook and apply the principles of food science, nutrition and healthy eating. It encourages learners to cook, enables them to make informed decisions about food and nutrition and allows them to acquire knowledge to be able to feed themselves and others affordably and nutritiously, now and later in life.

Who would this course suit?

Pupils who are able to demonstrate effective and safe cooking skills by planning, preparing and cooking a variety of food commodities whilst using different cooking techniques and equipment.

• develop knowledge and understanding of the functional properties and chemical characteristics of food as well as a sound knowledge of the nutritional content of food and drinks.

• understand the relationship between diet, nutrition and health, including the physiological and psychological effects of poor diet and health.

• understand the economic, environmental, ethical and socio-cultural influences on food availability, production processes, diet and health choices. French



What will I study?

The aims of this qualification are to:

• provide a coherent, satisfying and worthwhile course of study.

• develop confidence in, and a positive attitude towards French and to recognise the importance of languages.

• provide a strong linguistic and cultural foundation for students who go on to study languages at a higher level post-16.

• develop students' ability and ambition to communicate independently in speech and writing with speakers of French for authentic purposes.

• develop students' ability to communicate independently about subjects that are meaningful and interesting to them

• build pupils' confidence and broaden their horizons, enabling them to step beyond familiar cultural boundaries, develop new ways of seeing the world, and better understand relationships between the foreign language and the English language.

• enable pupils to become familiar

with the multifaceted world of French speaking around the globe, and open a window into the contexts and cultures of the countries and communities where French is spoken.

Who would this course suit? Pupils who are excited by speaking, listening, reading, writing in a new language.

How can I use this course after Year 11 / in the future?

Languages are more than words. This qualification promotes culture, communication and connection. From the design of the speaking tasks, where communication is privileged, through to the use of authentic material to provide cultural context, we want students to understand that words are a springboard to discovering much more, and opening many doors, whether it be at university, in the world of work, or abroad on holiday.

A language at GCSE is a springboard for the future.

Geography



What will I study?

Pupils will develop their understanding of human and physical geography and develop what they've already learnt at KS3. Pupils will have the opportunity to work on several case studies.

Who would this course suit?

With respect to numerical and statistical skills, learners should be able to:

1. Demonstrate an understanding of number, area and scale.

2. Demonstrate an understanding of the quantitative relationships between units.

3. Understand and correctly use proportion, ratio, magnitude and frequency.

4. Understand and correctly use appropriate measures of central tendency, spread and cumulative frequency including, median, mean, range, quartiles and interquartile range, mode and modal class. 5. Calculate and understand percentages (increase and decrease) and percentiles.
6. Design fieldwork data collection sheets and collect data with an understanding of accuracy, sample size and procedures, control groups and reliability.
7. Interpret tables of data.
8. Describe relationships in

8. Describe relationships in bivariate data.

9. Sketch trend lines through scatter plots.

 Draw estimated lines of best fit.
 Make predictions; interpolate and extrapolate trends from data.
 Be able to identify weaknesses in statistical presentations of data.
 Draw and justify conclusions from numerical and statistical data.

How can I use this course after Year 11 / in the future?

Geography is a highly valued qualification which can lead to further study or careers in the natural sciences.

What will I study?

Thematic study: Migrants to Britain 1250-present day British Depth Study: The Elizabethans 1580-1603 History Around Us: Kenilworth Castle Period Study: The Making of America 1789-1900 World Depth Study: Living under Nazi Rule 1933-45

Who would this course suit?

Pupils keen on developing their: • Research Skills: Ability to locate and analyze historical sources, both primary and secondary, to gather information.

• Critical Thinking: Capacity to evaluate historical events, arguments, and evidence, drawing reasoned conclusions.

- Essay Writing: Proficiency in crafting coherent and structured essays, effectively communicating historical knowledge and analysis.
- Chronological Understanding: Skill to arrange events and developments in chronological order, grasping their context and significance.

• Historical Interpretation: Capability to understand diverse historical perspectives and interpretations, fostering a wellrounded view of the past.

How can I use this course after Year 11 / in the future?

•Legal Historian (Law): Combining legal expertise with historical knowledge, you can specialize in understanding the evolution of laws and legal systems, contributing to legal research and policy making.

• Journalist/Writer (Media): Apply your research and analytical skills to write historical articles, documentaries, or scripts, engaging audiences with fascinating stories from the past.

• Policy Analyst (Government): Historical understanding can inform policy decisions, making you a valuable asset in government roles, where you analyse the historical context of policy issues.

And many more besides! History is a great subject, highly valued by employers and offers a range of options for the future.

Mathematics



What will I study?

Pupils will learn mathematics through a range of learning experiences including problem solving in a wide variety of contexts, investigations, data analysis and mathematical reasoning.

Pupils will have the opportunity to gain a deeper understanding of number, ratio and proportion, geometry, algebra, statistics and probability.

Who would this course suit?

Developing fluency in numeracy skills and problem solving. Developing confidence in material studied at KS3 in number; algebra; ratio proportion and rates of change; geometry and measures; probability and statistics.

How can I use this course after Year 11 / in the future?

Entry requirement for most subjects and careers, including a strong grade for many science subjects post 16. A-level Mathematics and Further Mathematics Core Mathematics Level 3 Example jobs - architecture, engineers, financial sector.

ASSESSMENT DETAILS:

- Three exam papers at the end of Yr 11.

Psychology



Psychology is the study of human behaviour and the human brain why we do the things we do. So if you are interested in people, and want to learn more about what makes us tick – then Psychology will be a good choice for you. Psychology is a Science, it looks at experiments that psychologists have done, what they were trying to find out, and how successful their experiments have been and you will be asked to devise and carry out experiments, to see what you can find out about people's behaviours and minds. Psychology is also an opportunity to discover how unpredictable and amazing human beings are, and to explore further how much our brain controls us... or how much we control our brain.

What will I study?

Psychology will likely follow the Edexcel course, which has 2 examinations. The new syllabus from 2018 will study the following themes: Unit 1 Topics – Development, Memory, Psychological problems, the Brain and Neuropsychology, Social Influence Unit 2 Topics – Research methods, and two from: Criminal Psychology, the self, Perception, Sleep and Dreaming, Language and Communication.

Who would this course suit?

Pupils who have enjoyed PHRSE and enjoy discussions, debates, and finding out why people behave in certain ways. Pupils who enjoy science and enjoy thinking creatively and thinking of imaginative responses. Pupils who have a good memory – there's lot of content! Pupils who are determined and like a challenge. Psychology is new to you all!

How will I learn?

Pupils will learn about Psychology - they will investigate famous experiments and psychologists and will evaluate their findings and how accurate they think they are. You will also find out about the different types of psychologists and what 'being a psychologist' actually means. We will ask you to devise, conduct and write up experiments - to come up with hypotheses, gather data effectively, and conduct experiments using a variety of participants. We will ask you to debate and discuss many varied topics, such as illusions, dreams, memories, violence, phobias, fear, obedience, ethics, upbringing and senses.

How can I use this course after Year 11 / in the future?

Psychology is a hugely popular subject in KS5 If you choose this, it shows that you are interested in people and human behaviour. Psychology relates well to other Social Sciences subjects such as Law and Sociology, as well as other subjects such as humanities and some aspects of science. Psychology study gives you skills of analysis and perception, and a better understanding of human beings and why we may behave the way we do. This means that any career involving interactions with people, could benefit from Psychology. This could involve almost any career – but often Psychology graduates may find themselves working in areas such as teaching and social work, and the separate disciplines of Psychology itself, such as: • Educational Psychology • Sports Psychology • Clinical Psychology • Health Psychology • Occupational Psychology • Counselling Psychology • Forensic Psychology

How will my work be assessed?

Assessment will be ongoing, where pupils will be introduced to real GCSE questions and will become familiar with the layout and demands of GCSE exams.

Religious Studies



What will I study?

GCSE FULL – Component 1: The study of religious beliefs, teachings, and practices Component 2: Thematic studies (4 in total)

Short Course –

Section A: The study of religions: beliefs and teachings of two religions from the following:

- Christianity
- Islam
- Judaism
- Buddhism.

Section B: Thematic studies: religious, philosophical and ethical studies:

• Theme A: Relationships and families

• Theme B: Religion, peace and conflict

Who would this course suit?

Evaluate

How can I use this course after Year 11 / in the future?

An education in Religious Studies opens doors to students. It may offer the opportunity to specialise in a specific field of religious studies such as political science, philosophy and the law which lead to a wide range of industries such as business, government, medicine, non-profit, counselling, careers within the law and lecturing.

Biology, Chemistry, Physics Triple Award



What will I study?

As an option subject, pupils have the opportunity to extend their science curriculum. Pupils will study combined science but will have additional science lessons where they will study additional topics within Biology, Chemistry and Physics. After 2 years of study, pupils will receive a single GCSE for each science subject giving a total of 3 GCSEs.

Please note: It is a common misconception that pupils must study separate science if they want to pursue science at A-Level or beyond. Whilst studying separate science does help to bridge a gap between GCSE and A-Level, it is not an essential requirement for most Sixth Form colleges, and certainly will not be a requirement of Houlton Sixth Form. Universities are also unlikely to discriminate between pupils who have or have not taken separate science as a GCSE option, and will more often than not, look at attainment and subject choice at A-Level.

Spanish



What will I study?

The aims of this qualification are to:

• build pupils' confidence and broaden their horizons, enabling them to step beyond familiar cultural boundaries, develop new ways of seeing the world, and better understand relationships between the foreign language and the English language.

How can I use this course after Year 11 / in the future?

Performing Arts: Dance

What will I study?

This qualification is for pupils who want to acquire sector-specific knowledge and skills through realistic vocational contexts. The learning programme enables both academic and practical progression and consists of three components.

Component 1: Exploring the Performing Arts. Pupils will develop their understanding of the performing arts by examining the work of performing arts professionals and the processes used to create performance.

Component 2: Developing Skills and Techniques in the Performing Arts.

Pupils will develop their performing arts skills and techniques through the reproduction of dance repertoire.

Component 3: Responding to a Brief.

Pupils will be given the opportunity to work as part of a group to

create a performance in response to a brief.

How can I use this course after Year 11 / in the future?

- Study of a vocational qualification at Level 3, such as a BTEC National in Performing Arts, which prepares learners to enter employment or apprenticeships, or to move on to higher education by studying a degree in the performing arts.

ASSESSMENT DETAILS:

Component 1: Exploring the Performing Arts (60 marks- 30% of final grade).

Non-exam internal assessment set by Pearson, marked by the centre (the teacher) and moderated by Pearson. The Pearson-set Assignment will be completed in approximately 12 hours of supervised assessment.

Component 2: Developing Skills and Techniques in the Performing Arts (60 marks- 30% of final grade). Non-exam internal assessment set by Pearson, marked by the centre and moderated by Pearson. The Pearsonset Assignment will be completed in approximately 15 hours of supervised assessment.

Component 3: Responding to a Brief (60 marks- 40% of final grade). Task set and marked by Pearson completed under supervised conditions. Pupils will be given the set task in January of Year 11, 12 weeks before the supervised assessment period, in order to carry out the development of creative ideas and rehearsal for the workshop performance. The set task will be completed in 3 hours within the period timetabled by Pearson.

Throughout the learning programme, pupils will be responding to ongoing teacher-feedback to develop their knowledge and skills. Pupils will engage in reflective practice which allows them to identify strengths and areas for improvements, through a "logbook".
